## **Obamacare's "Federally Facilitated Marketplace", Gabrielle Warner**

The passage of the Affordable Care Act of 2010 (Obamacare) will significantly change the way health care is provided in the future. It is intended to reshape the way health care is funded, improve the quality and accountability for the health care provided and reduce the proportion of people who are uninsured. It is also extending coverage to more preventative services, which in the long run will improve the health for more citizens while reducing the cost for their health care. As the provisions of the law are implemented, there will be needed adjustments along the way, just as there were when changes were after the enactment of the Medicare and Medicaid legislation in the 1960's.

On the immediate horizon will be decisions by individuals and families on their health insurance coverage. Most people will not be affected. As of October 1, 2013, many individuals will be able to select their coverage through a Health Insurance Exchange.

As our speaker will discuss, there are emerging choices, both on and off of the Exchange. These are choices we will be hearing more and more about in the coming weeks as the Health Insurance Exchanges are implemented in each state. In Michigan, it may be more difficult because the State legislature refused to participate in developing the Michigan Exchange and the Federal government was forced to design the system as it has had to do in several other states.

Our speaker today is Gabrielle Warner, owner of Innovative Solutions Agency, Inc. and Michigan Benefits Navigator, LLC. With 27 years of experience as a financial professional and licensed agent, she has experience in the design and delivery of insurance strategies for businesses of all sizes and personal benefit plans for individuals and families. These include financial analysis, strategic planning and project management

surrounding employee benefits, with attention to small business issues, alternative funding arrangements and H.S.A. implementation. In her bio, she suggests that good communications is a key. She is Past-President of the Cedar Springs Rotary Club (2010) and is active in Business Network International and the Michigan Association of Health Underwriters. Lion Brent Spoelstra said, "To that end, we need to ship in advance 8,000-10,000 pairs of glasses by November 15, 2013. He continued, "The eyeglass committee is looking for some nimble fingers to assist with the data entry in order to meet our goal. If you can help us with this by volunteering your time and skills on Tuesday evenings or during any business hours (once you are familiar with the system), please contact me. **Note:** The Recycling Center will be open on every Tuesday from 6:00 – 8:00 pm.

## Disparities in Eye Care Could Cost Some Their Sight Survey

**Americans with low incomes and education levels are less likely to get eye care**, a new study finds. Researchers examined data from nearly 3,600 people, aged 40 and older, who took part in the 2002 U.S. National Health Interview Survey, and 3,100 who took part in the 2008 survey. In 2002, people with low incomes were much less likely than those with higher incomes to say that they'd visited an eye doctor, about 63 percent versus 80 percent.



The investigators found that people with less than a high school degree were less likely than those with at least a college education to say that they'd visited an eye doctor (nearly 63 percent versus 81 percent, respectively), or to have had a dilated eye examination (just under 65 percent versus just over 81 percent, respectively).

"There is a need for increased awareness about the relationship between social circumstances and [age-related eye disease], and for more research to determine how income and educational inequalities affect health-seeking behavior at the community and individual level over time," Dr. Xinzhi Zhang, of the U.S. National Institutes of Health, and colleagues wrote in the report. The study was published online July 18 in the journal *JAMA Ophthalmology*.

In recent years, there have been many medical advances in the treatment and prevention of age-related eye diseases, including macular degeneration, diabetic retinopathy and glaucoma. And, in the case of cataracts, vision loss many even be reversible. However, to benefit from these interventions, people must have access to eye care, the researchers noted in a journal news release.
