Tuesday, March 7 Urban Roots Community Farm, Levi Garner

The mission of Urban Roots is "to cultivate durable and resilient families, communities and ecosystems through urban agriculture. We are locally minded place-makers who believe that growing food is an invitation into being fully human."

Urban Roots, LLC, was formed in 2013 by Levi Gardner to begin understanding and explore the potential of urban agriculture to use as a transformational tool in Grand Rapids. In the first two years, he visited numerous urban farms, social enterprise organizations and other holistic centers for social, ecological and



community empowerment throughout the country.

In 2015, following two years of urban farming and teaching throughout the city of Grand Rapids, Levi and his team collaborated with the Madison neighborhood to begin their work. With the move into one of the most devastated and yet culturally rich areas of Grand Rapids, Urban Roots began the true process of learning from the neighborhood to develop this work in resilient ways. During this time, they established a board, crafted the guiding principles and received its 501(c)3 status. They are committed to the idea of building a regenerative organizational model to foster: 1) empowerment over charity, 2) stewardship over dominance and 3) community over privatization. Though sometimes challenging, we have remained committed to the idea that cultivation - stewarding that which already exists - is far more powerful than construction, i.e., imposing a set of ideas onto an already functioning system.

The Urban Roots' website states that "we have been on the journey to establish our organization as one dedicated not only to

urban agriculture for the sake of growing food, but rather to engage in the fundamental act of what it means to be a human being. Today, we are convinced that urban agriculture has the capacity to cultivate resiliency in both social and ecological spheres. By building honest and rich collaborations throughout our neighborhoods and our city, we believe that urban agriculture can simultaneously be a platform for healthy food access, experiential pedagogy, economic development, ecological stewardship, community revitalization and social empowerment."

Mr. Gardner, founder and executive director of Urban Roots, is a West Michigan native, lives in Grand Rapids and our presenter today. He has an M.S. in Community Sustainability and Ecological Food and Farming systems, experience in bio-intensive and organic growing and is a certified Permaculture Designer. He is gives frequent workshops and lectures on food systems, agroecology, and the pedagogy of place.

Tuesday, March 14 Barracks 616 Firearms, Jason Ambrose

He manages and mentors a team of twenty employees in sales and customer service, manage incoming and outbound stock and works directly with government employees to train them on regulatory processes. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan.

Here is a start, but it may come in different forms at times. Let's see how it goes. At the January Board meeting, here are highlights:

- Vice President Ed Thauer will head up planning for our celebration of our 100th anniversary of the Club founding in 1919 (Nov 14). We will try to get a "big name" speaker for the main celebration.
- ➤ The Annual VI Field Trip for VI students in Kent Country was approved. Because the excursion to Camp Tuhsmeheta, outside of Greenville, was such a success for the kids, Kent ISD asked if they could go back again this year.
- President Shawn Eyestone reported that Cheryl Anderson will assist Craig Nobbelin in the secretarial duties by reporting out club's activities to Lions Clubs International.
- ➤ LCI's 100th Anniversary (1017-2017) will be celebrated at our Annual Meeting in June 2017.
- A survey of members will be developed and implemented this winter/spring to find out what each member thinks on several issues.
- ➤ The Social Committee reported adding some members to achieve a goal of having one social activity each month.
- Membership: Robert Clay resigned due to health issues.
- At its March meeting, the Board will make decisions on most of the donations the club will make this year.

The Board received the final report from the Kids Shopping Event at Meijers. Due to increased donations and Anne's Baird's Use of Meijer M-Perks & coupons (over \$1,000 savings on purchases), the costs to the club were down this year.

Saint Patrick?

How many of us know the history about Saint Patrick's Day or the Feast of Saint Patrick? It is a cultural and religious celebration held on March 17, the traditional death date of Saint Patrick. He is the foremost patron saint of Ireland.

Saint Patrick's Day was made an official Christian feast day in the early 17th century and is observed by many Christian denominations. This day celebrates the heritage and culture of the Irish in general. Celebrations generally involve public parades and festivals and the wearing of green, and is a holiday in some countries.

Patrick was a 5th-century Romano-British Christian missionary and bishop in Ireland. He was born in Roman Britain in the fourth century into a wealthy family. His father was a deacon and his grandfather was a priest in the Christian church. According to the *Declaration (written by Patrick himself)*, at the age of 16, he was kidnapped by Irish raiders and taken as a slave to Gaelic Ireland. He spent six years working as a shepherd and that during this time, he "found God". God told Patrick to flee to the coast, where a ship would be waiting to take him home. After making his way home, Patrick went on to become a priest.

According to tradition, Patrick returned to Ireland to convert the pagan Irish to Christianity. He spent many years evangelizing in the northern half of Ireland and converting "thousands". Tradition holds that he died on March 17 and was buried at Downpatrick. Over the following centuries, many legends grew up around Patrick and he became Ireland's foremost saint.



According to legend, Saint Patrick used the three-leaved shamrock to explain the Holy Trinity to Irish pagans. Christians may attend church services and the Lent, and restrictions on eating and drinking alcohol are lifted for the day. Perhaps because of this, drinking alcohol – particularly Irish whiskey, beer or cider – has become an integral part of St. Patrick Day celebrations.

The color green has been associated with Ireland since at least the 1640s. During the 1790s, green would become associated with Irish nationalism, due to its use by the united Irishmen. Throughout the 19th and 20th centuries, the color green and its association with St Patrick's Day grew.
