It is a ministry which specializes in assisting and partnering with organizations and individuals to send supplies or family members on projects in Haiti and many other third and fourth world countries. It is a volunteer-based organization. She has 5 married children & 9 grandchildren.

Tuesday, October 8 9-11 Relief Efforts by the Salvation Army, Mike McKee

The Salvation Army was the first relief agency to reach Ground Zero September 11, 2001, reporting within a half-hour after the first plane crash at the World Trade Center site. About 39,000 Salvation Army officers, volunteers and staff provided assistance during that time. They served relief workers at the scene for nine months until operations at Ground Zero officially concluded in May, 2002. This relief effort, called "Operation Compassion Under Fire" gave The Salvation Army full control of the feeding operation at Ground Zero. It served 3.2 million meals during those months and provided emotional and spiritual counseling

and support to rescue and recovery-personnel.

This action is what The Salvation Army does every time tragic natural or manmade events occur. It offers a variety of services in response to disasters: shelter, emergency assistance, donations management, emotional & spiritual care, emergency communications, disaster management, clean-up & reconstruction and partnerships with other local and disaster services. Mike McGee of The Salvation Army will talk about its activities during the 9-11 disaster.

West Michigan Miracle League Dedicated

Several hundred people and many children with handicaps attended the West Michigan Miracle Field dedication on a very nice day - Saturday, September 21 at 12:00 pm at the Nate Hurwitz Field. This is the first field to be finished at the Art Van Baseball/Softball Sports Complex located about a mile east of the intersection of US 131 & 10 Mile Road. The sports complex 12 field layout (8 minimum in phase 1) has been designed to host tournaments and serve various age groups. Also planned is an adjacent playground designed for individuals with disabilities, once funds have been raised.

The Nate Hurwitz Field is made of a specialty designed rubber, so kids with physical or mental disabilities can get around without any problem. The bases and infield are designed into the surface, so there is nothing to trip over. About 40 kids had a chance to play to play baseball for the first time.

The total Art Van Sports Complex will cost about \$6 million, with the Miracle field costing about \$550,000. The Grand Rapids Lions Club Board of Directors pledged to contribute \$10,000 to help build fund the "Miracle Field", matching a pledge that the Rockford Lions Club made. Our pledge will be paid over 5 years, beginning in 2013. A picture of the Lions Club logo and our name are pictured along the third base side. Lions represented at the dedicated were President Scott Brady & his wife, Mary, 2nd Vice President Don Jakel, Secretary Craig Nobbelin and Membership Director Jacqueline Smart-Parrish.

Michigan Lions Leadership Institute
