In Memory of Clarence "Chuck" W. Harris October 31, 1921 – May 24, 2015

Lion Clarence W. Harris died on Sunday, May 24, 2015 at his home at Porter Hills Village, Grand Rapids. He was 93 years old. He was born on October 30, 1921. He is survived by his wife of 69 years, Zita Dobray Harris, nephews Jack Pool, Richard (Nora) Dobrygoski, James Dobrygoski; nieces Judy (Don) Looman, Sandra (Dave) McKone; and several great nieces and nephews

He became a member of the Grand Rapids Lions Club on February 1, 1955, sponsored by Lion Earl Unseld. He was a 60year Lions Monarch, for which he was awarded his 60-year Chevron when several Lions visited him this April. In 1993, Chuck was the recipient of the "Henry Voet Award for Outstanding Service to Lionism". Chuck had not attended meetings in recent years because of mobility issues and earlier this year entered hospice care.

Chuck spent his career in the heating and cooling business before retiring in 1982. He was active in his church and in Lions, an avid sportsman and participated in our Lions bowling league and summer golf outings. After golf, Lions would find him playing cards and smoking his cigar. He was a B-24 bomber pilot in the Army Air Force during World War II. He was shot down over Germany later in the war and spent about 6 months in a German prisoner of war camp before the war ended in Europe.

One of the things that few, if any, current Lions know was that Chuck was a poet. Four of his poems were displayed at his memorial mass, one of which follows this memorial article. Others may appear in future newsletters.

A Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated on May 29 at 11:00

am at St. Paul the Apostle Church. He specified that memorial contributions should be made to the Grand Rapids Lions Club.

Yes, I'm a Lion member And I'm proud as I can be, But there's one thing to remember, There are hundreds more like me.



Humor and Suspense at the Lion's 2014 Annual Meeting

Fifty-six Lions and guests enjoyed the Grand Rapids Lions Club's Annual Meeting on Tuesday, June 9 at Blythefield Country Club. After a lot of socializing and piano music by Jack Kimmell, President Don Jakel opened the meeting with Mark Oberlin leading the singing of God Bless America. Following the Pledge of Allegiance and the Innovation, the dinner (entrée' of sirloin steak or walleye) was served.

Since this is the first year under the new Lions structure in which the three top officers are beginning their second year, President Don felt a change-of-pace was in order: He welcomed Mark Oberlin back to the platform to introduce the entertainment for the night: Comedian Rob Johnson. Lion Mark noted that he had known "Robby" most of Rob's life, attended the Forest Hills school system and West Michigan University and then, with the encouragement of his parents (Rob Johnson & former Lion Lynn Johnson) is pursuing his dream as a stand-up comic in Chicago. Given the number of laughs and groans he got from the Lions and guests, he is well on his way to fulfilling his dream.

After the entertainment, President Don reminded us of the sad news from this year: the passing of devoted Lions Clarence Anderson, Rev. Chuck Fry and Chuck Harris. Then, he recognized four new Lions who joined over the last year: Lions Diana Bergquist, Benjamin Eavey, Michel Murphy (rejoined) and Kathy Oberlin.

President Don reported on our service projects and fund raising events. The Meijer Kids Shopping event served a record number of kids (43) in shopping for Christmas presents their families. Regular eyeglasses recycling sessions were held every Tuesday night, with two mission trip held this year – one to Jamaica and the other to Playa del Carmen, Mexico. The Lions Club annually sponsors a field trip for visually impaired students – this year to Camp Tuhsmeheta with 35 students from across Kent County. On May 30, VI Sports Day was held despite the rain when the activities moved inside Wealthy Elementary School. Lions' luncheon programs took place every noon from September to last week.

Continuing on to our Club's fund raising events, President Don noted a record year for calendar sales, the Blind Dinner Date which featured Christine Ha, the first ever blind contestant and season 3 winner of the competitive amateur cooking show, <u>"MasterChef"</u> USA, a successful White Cane Drive and an expected "profitable" Grand Rapids Ophthalmology Drive for Vision the following Monday. In

addition, the Grand Rapids Lions Club Fund (at the Grand Rapids Community Foundation) generated upward of \$20,000 that the club distributes to our primary charities and other charitable causes.

President Don made the Award Presentations that included:

- Rookie of the Year Award: Candidates are Lions members who join Lions within the past 2 years and have demonstrated good attendance, shown initiative, motivated others by setting a good example and participated in Club projects. Last year's recipients, Lion Gail Junod and Lion Jean Kraai, were given a replacement plaque for the Joseph M. Trenshaw Memorial Rookie of the Year Trophy. This year's Rookie of the Year Award was presented to a Lion who participated in many activities and stepped up to help organize the Drive for Vision golf outing: Lion Kyle Travis.
- The Lion of the Year was presented to two individuals who made significant contributions in developing the marketing and communication portions of the club's strategic plan: Lion Pat Mullen and Lion Mike Murphy.
- The Henry Voet Award for Outstanding Service to Lionism is the highest award that the Grand Rapids Lions can bestow. The recipient of the 68th annual Henry Voet Award was selected by the Past-Presidents of the Grand Rapids Lions Club by secret ballot. Last year's recipient, Lion Charles Fry, died in January and was recognized. In a renewed tradition made famous by deceased Lion Danny Palmatier, Lion Mark Oberlin hoisted the trophy and walked through the room, pausing here and there, before holding the trophy over the head of the 2015 recipient: Lion Craig Nobbelin.
- The Lions president has the option to present *special awards* to Lions who have distinguished themselves. Present Don selected two Lions this year:
 - President Appreciation Award: Lions Anne Baird who helped organize the Meijer Kids Shopping Event and the White Cane Drive, in addition fulfilling a new role for President Don to follow up on special requests which primarily related to vision resources that she knows so well.
 - Appreciation Award Tail Twister Extraordinaire: Lion Mike Luhn who served as our Club's tail-twister for many years, making the luncheons seem fun while imposing fines and gathering "Happy Dollars", welcoming guests and touting the victories of Ohio State University, his alma mater. Lion Mike is moving to South Carolina to be closer to his grandchildren.

Other Lion News

Eyeglasses Recycling: The first recycling night will be Sept. 8, the day after Labor Day. Brent Spoelstra said, "We have a healthy start on our stock of glasses for the next trip, which allows us a breather for the summer. While there are no scheduled work nights over the summer, several parties have expressed an interest in doing some work, and we are making efforts to accommodate them." Bent continued, "Numerous members have inquired [*about the next mission trip*], but we have not yet nailed down a site for our next mission trip. Once that is set, we will be able to estimate the patient load and the size of the team needed to handle the clinic."
