Tuesday, November 4 Grand Rapids Community College Celebrates 100 Years, Steve Ender

Grand Rapids Junior College was the first junior college in Michigan on September 21, 1914, after the University of Michigan faculty passed a resolution encouraging the establishment of junior colleges in Michigan. It initially operated out of Grand Rapids Central High School. Four years later, it received its initial accreditation.

Over several years, the junior college moved to its current location and acquired several buildings. By the 1980's and 1990's, the junior college was rated among the finest nationally. In 1989, it began offering classes in Ottawa County through the Ottawa Area ISD Career Tech Center. In 1991, the junior college separated from the Grand Rapids Public School District to become an independent public institution and was renamed Grand Rapids Community College (GRCC). As the college continued to experience growth, the college was fortunate enough to acquire the former Davenport College after Davenport moved to the suburbs in order to expand.

Our presenter at today's meeting, Dr. Steve Enders, became the ninth chief executive of GRCC. During his more than 30 years in higher education, Dr. Ender has held numerous teaching, counseling and administrative positions and has published extensively in refereed journals as well as textbooks.

His most recent position prior to the GRCC presidency was serving as president of Westmoreland Community College. He is a Richmond, Virginia native, holds a bachelor's degree in business management (Virginia Commonwealth University), master's and doctoral degrees in education (University of Georgia), and has completed post-doctoral studies at The Snowmass Institute in Snowmass, Colorado and Harvard University. He resides in Grand Rapids with his wife and is the father of two adult children.

Tuesday, November 11 InterOil – The Real Story, Galen Byker

Since launching and having held many positions in the company, our speaker today, Gaylen Byker, will tell us his story about InterOil. He will describe its history of energy discovery, evolving from a developmental company into a producing company, and many stories of trials and tribulations.



InterOil was founded in 1997 and is an independent oil and gas company with a primary focus on Papua New Guinea. It is developing one of Asia's largest gas fields as a joint venture with France's Total and Oil Search of Papua New Guinea. Its exploration licenses cover about 16,000 square kilometers in the Eastern Papuan Basin.

A native of Hudsonville, Dr. Byker is a former international businessman and former President of Calvin College in Grand Rapids. He is also a director for InterOil Corporation. He served in the United States Army from 1967 until 1970.

Following his service in the Vietnam War, he attended Calvin College, graduating in 1973. He received a master's degree and a JD in World Politics from the University of

Michigan, as well as a doctorate from the University of Pennsylvania. After completing his education, he worked in the fields of international banking and energy and also taught at American University of Beirut. Dr. Byker married Susan Lemmen in 1970 and they have two daughters. Dr. Byker retired as president of Calvin College at the end of the 2011-2012 academic year.
