Tuesday, February 2 The Current Real Estate Market, John Rice

On February 2, Lion John Rice substituted for the scheduled speaker and spoke on the current residential real estate market. John said the market is <u>hot</u> nationally and in West Michigan. Here is a portion of what John said.

Nationally, over 14,600 homes are sold every day. Compared to last year, sales are up 3.9%, prices are up 5.8% and the inventory of homes is down 4.5%. There is only a 3.9 month supply of homes compared to a typical average of 6 or more months.

In West Michigan, 2015 sales prices were up 9.1% over 2014 and the days on the market is down over 20%. The still- historic low interest rates (about 4% for 30 year mortgage) make homes more affordable (compare the mortgage rates over previous 4 decades: 8.86%, 12.7%, 8.12%, 6.29%. People can buy more even with the higher home prices.

This region is great for attracting individuals and families: lower home prices, good job climate and a varied selection of things to do. Many are returning to Michigan to be closer to family, raise their kids, live closer to friends and lower living costs. It is also brings in people from other countries (e.g., medical mile) and from places like Chicago. West Michigan and Grand Rapids have also been rated highly by a number of different organizations.

About 52% of all buyers have been first time home buyers. John noted that there is a cycle of home ownership: starting out with a small beginner home, "graduating" to a larger home to raise a family and then moving into a smaller home or condo.

John's "Crystal Ball" suggests this will continue:

- ✓ #5 Even if mortgage rise, they will still be low;
- ✓ #4 Neighbors downsizing may encourage others on the block to do the same;

- \checkmark #3 Neighbors across the street are selling and preparing to build new;
- ✓ #2 Children are moving back to Grand Rapids for their dream jobs, and it beats raising a family in Chicago;
- ✓ #1 Within 3 years, their friends will discover Grand Rapids and move here.

Lions John Rice joined the Grand Rapids Lions Club in 2003, sponsored by Lion Jeff Dodson. He has been our Board President and has been active in many of our activities. He has been a realtor since 2002 and is now the Principal Agent for Berkshire Hathaway Home Services. John has written a real estate book, "Make the Right Move" which is available in a number of local bookstores. John graduated from Aquinas College. He is married to Ashley, and they have 1 daughter age 7.

Tuesday, February 9 Substance Abuse/Heroin Use, Matt Hanlon

Addiction to drugs and other substances is a pervasive and devastating public health concern/crisis among all social and economic groups. Illicit use of prescription drugs and hereditary alcoholism claims new victims. Young addicts and alcoholics may not seek help, but when they seek help and treatment, there are barriers and lack of access. In addition, it is a burden, economically and emotionally, to families and society.

In recent years, inexpensive heroin has often replaced expensive drugs with devastating effect. Often addicts don't know or realize the varying potency of different "batches" of illicit drugs. This can lead to tragedy and progression of drug use.

Matt Hanlon will talk about addiction and drug use, and the programs available through the Guiding Light Mission (GLM). GLM exists to create a healing experience that allows individuals to discover a new life in Christ. <u>GLM expects re-engagement in community</u>. It provides food and shelter to all and resources to men that support their social, physical, spiritual, and intellectual needs. Under the leadership of Stuart Ray, the evolution GLM has taken over two years is was needed to assist GLM's clients as they move from being homeless and addicted to people to ones who are healthy, viable, and contributing members of society.
