#### Looking Back – Grand Rapids Lions Club – 1960

As we approach our 100th anniversary in 2019, and as the club looks forward, this series of articles looks back on the activities of the club, this time drawing upon Nuda Veritas editions that we have in our archives from 1960.

The Tuesday weekly luncheons continued at the Pantlind Hotel. Here are a few programs:

• The year started out with a presentation, "Journey to Understanding" by NBC's foreign news correspondent, Welles Hangen. He had covered major news stories of the day, including interviews with Prime Minister

- Nehru of India and Egyptian President Nassar. He reported news from Syria, Jordan, Iraq, Kuwait, Ghana, Morocco, Turkey, Germany, Russia and elsewhere.
- Nationally known as the outdoor man from Anchorage, Alaska, Bud Branham, talked about his life "as a bush pilot, prospector, big game hunter and fishing guide, and winter trapper with dog and sled." He also worked for the US Arctic Rescue Service and, guiding and hunting for grizzles in Kodiak Island.
- Store Detective "Grandma" Deva Weber, who worked for Herpolsheimers, recounted how she kept her eagle eye on what was happening in the store.

#### **The Koinonia Farm Community**

[Note: Remember, this was 1960.]

"Dr. Clarence Jordan, the founder of the Koinonia Farm Community, a unique farming project located at Americus, Georgia" spoke to the club about the project. "The Koinonia Community is a project started to help the Negro farm peoples of the south to become more proficient in their farming practices and marketing methods. His willingness to help the Negro help himself roused the wrath of his white neighbors and has caused no end of problems."

"Dr. Jordan and his community have been the victims of vicious attacks using gangster tactics in attempts to drive him away from his project and try to destroy what he has been able to create, merely because he dared to be an individual than a conformist. Mr. Jordan has been threatened because he dared to stand for justice and fair play for all. The Jordan's have had their guests leave their home in the early hours of the morning, because machine gun fire had been turned on their home during the night and the resulting bullets had bored through the walls of the guests' bedrooms."

Another time the folks of this community arose one morning to find that their roadside stand had been dynamited and the products not ruined by the blast of the powder, were burned up in the resulted fire destroying many dollar's worth of saleable goods."

- John Martin, former State Senator and Auditor General, talked on "Political Parties 1960 Model". During the war, he served in Washington and later was on the US Prosecutor's staff at the War Criminal Trials in Nuremberg.
- Another Lion's member, A. Dale Stoppels, Judge of Probate Court, presented "A Judge's Observations about Juvenile Offenders." In 1959, he "was named Outstanding Young Man of the Year in Grand Rapids by the Junior Chamber of Commerce . . . Later he was one of five young men named outstanding in the entire State of Michigan." He had served in the South Pacific as a Naval officer during WW II, and was Kent County Prosecuting Attorney from 1953 to 1958.
- Boy Scout Executive Brandmiller updated the club of the "Accomplishments of Boy Scout Activities and Progress."
- "Students of Junior College, 130 strong, will invade the Ballroom at the Pantlind on Tuesday to present its annual MUSICAL MOODS . . . for the full 45 minutes."
- Some or most of you know that the airport is not where it is today. It was where Roger B Chaffee Drive and the manufacturing strip is today. "... the question of whether it [the new airport] should be in the west, south, east or north... voting properly comes June 7 and ascertain whether or not they should vote for or against the proposed Bond issues." Consultant for the building the new airport, James Buckley, and local engineering firm, J & G Daverman Company, a local engineering firm, [will] come up with all questions ..."
- The summer season, July and August, brought with it golf & meetings every other week.
- Retired teacher, Howard Wickett, returns to the podium with talk titled "Musing of a Senior Citizen" for the first meeting on the year. "He has presented both serious and humorous subjects. This time he will confine himself strictly to humor and inject the kind of

elixir that will make you think you're a young colt full of pepsicola."

"Bahama Adventure" was produced and presented by "Ray Boozer, friend of teenagers, noted educator, expert photographer and keen observer of all outdoors." He travelled with 30 Grand Rapids youngsters . . .

- "see them sailing, swimming, snorkeling and spear fishing in the coral reefs of the Bahamas Banks . . . have the time of their young lives in the great outdoors."
- US Representative Gerald R. Ford made his annual presentation to the Lions Club in September. He usually speaks "off the cuff" to provide "the facts as they appear on the horizon."
- For the program during Thanksgiving week, the Lions were treated to the "fine music . . . provided by the Madrigal Singers of Creston High School under the direction of well-known and talented Frank Goodwin."
- Dr. John Jellema presented "a review of some of the current ideas of the nature of alcoholism, attempting to get at the root of the matter the fundamental problem, with a critical evaluation of various treatments offered. He will ask and answer many provocative questions . . ."

The Nuda Veritas also had numerous interesting comments, observations, and facts on Lion issues, including:

- Several article highlighted the efforts of Chuck McGinnis (who our seasoned Lions knew) in chairing the committee for the Lions Circus at Houseman Field, which was an event over several years to raise funds for the Boy Scouts. [Many of our past members were Eagle Scouts.] In the fall, Chairman Chuck submitted his final report showing a net profit of \$10,309.08. The funds were used for capital investment into Camp Lion and Camp Shiawondossee.
- The Lions purchased a \$400 piano a few years ago for the Braille class at Ottawa Hills School. One student Kenneth Medema, "took to the piano like a duck does to water" and he and several others students "were given equal opportunity to learn to play the piano and study music." Kenneth was chosen as "soloist with the Grand Rapids Youth Symphony orchestra in its spring planned spring concert." "This goes to show that our work with the blind has its rewards . . . All Ken needed was a helping hand, understanding of his hidden talents and encouragement."
- An article reminded members to stop to see Shelly Robinson at his studio to get or update their pictures for the Nuda Veritas and roster. [Today's Lions: remember to check your website member information to be sure it is up-to-date and to insert a picture since we no longer have an official photographer.]
- \* "From the top down, the Chamber of Commerce 20<sup>th</sup> Annual Great Lakes Cruise has been placed in the hands of hard-working and capable Lions. The Cruise, scheduled for June 14, 15, 16, and 16 starts in Holland, sails to Milwaukee, and returns over the Great Lakes to Grand Haven via Traverse City and Manistee . . . Joe Lentini is Commodore and Dick Simkins Vice-Commodore . . . The cruise comes after our own Portage Outing" the pervious long weekend.
- The Boy Scouts of America organization was celebrating its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary the past year.
- "Mary Smolenski had her 9<sup>th</sup> child. The record now stands at one boy (No. 1) and 8 girls. Bob's [Smolenski] check arrived for the 9<sup>th</sup> consecutive time . . ." [For those who don't recall, Bob would later become a Judge.]

immediate distribution of food to the Salvation Army and we kept another stable amount in storage until needed at a later time." That summer Dr. Lentini requested the remaining amount [\$1,250] "to recondition and refurbish the dining hall at the Army's summer camp for needy folk at Little Pine Island." The board heartily agreed.

- Tuesday, August 23 was picnic time for Lions' families, with "games [to] start at 4:00 o'clock and the food will be on the table at 6:30. In between, the youngsters and oldsters can partake of plenty of lollypops, paddlepops and soft drinks . . . Chairman Willie Wilburn has ordered good weather."
- The attendance at the last golf outing that summer at Cascade Country Club "was the greatest --- a solid 198. 74 Members and guests played golf, also a record."
- The annual Duck Lake outing was September 16-17.
- Lion "Charlie Merrill already has had requests for warmer clothing [late September]. He can use men's, women's and children's garments . . . in good condition and clean."
- Lion Bill Klein arranged for 'a pair of shoes known as The Gordon", retailing for \$30.00, to be fitted at his store to a lucky raffle winner.
- "In the October issue [1960] of The Michigan Lion, you will find a complete and comprehensive story of Welcome Home for the Aged Blind, freely illustrated with fascinating pictures." [It was located on the south end of Riverside Park.]
