Last month on February 12 -19, the vision mission team traveled to Izamal, Mexico to screen resident's eyes, identify prescriptions and provide eyeglasses which matched as close as possible to the prescriptions. Team members will offer their thoughts about its success.

Joel Koenig has talked to us previously. He retired from the Michigan State police after 26 years and has over 50 years of investigative experience in both the public and private sectors. He was the lead investigator on the James R. Hoffa case, and investigated homicides, financial crimes, narcotics, and public corruption. He is Past President of the Michigan FBI National Academy Associates and is a Certified Fraud Examiner (CFE) and a Forensic Linguist. He holds a BS in Accounting from Wayne State University and a Master's in Public Administration

from Eastern Michigan University. He now owns and operates KMI Investigations in Western Michigan, specializing in financial fraud investigations.

Looking Back – Grand Rapids Lions Club – January through December 1978

As we celebrate our 100th anniversary in 2019, and as the club looks forward, this series of articles looks back on the activities of the club, this time drawing upon Nuda Veritas editions that we have in our archives from January through December 1978. (some editions missing)

The Tuesday weekly luncheons continued at the Pantlind Hotel. Here are a few programs:

- Lexie Coxon, Acting President of Jordan College, talked about the growth of the college from a small church-owned institution to a nondenominational college. It would be geared “toward working class students who tend to have different needs than those who attend the more traditional liberal arts colleges.
- Two great local actors, Fred Sebulske and Jeralyn Pinsky, performed a selection from Pygmalion.
- Isabelle Starkey Nichols talked about how “90% of hearing-impaired individuals can be helped either medically – using operative procedures when necessary – or with a hearing aid. Among men, vanity is the great deterrent to wearing an aid.”
- Abe Drasin, Mayor of Grand Rapids, spoke about the state of the City.
- Wives of the Lions were invited to a special Valentine’s Day luncheon, serenaded by the Salt & Pepper Choir of Ottawa Hills High School.
- Speaking on banking was Standford “Chuck” Stoddard, President of Michigan National Corporation.
- Teacher Anne Smith, Ken-O-Sha School for VI Children, was “the only school in Kent County with a pre-school and infant blind program.” Until 1976, the VI students were housed at Brookside Elementary School.
- James Muldoon, MD, a colo-rectal surgeon practicing a Ferguson Clinic, talked about his profession.
- For the Easter Meditation, Rev. Tom Zollman shared a message, followed by the Central Christian Church Choir.
- Speaking about the Boy Scouts was Bruce Parsons, a local attorney and current President of the West Michigan Shores Council of the Boy Scouts of America.
- Lion Harold Tamblin, courtesy of Travelers Insurance Company, presents a film about the 1977 Master’s Golf Tournament.
- On April 11, the Lions honored the Grand Rapids High School Girls’ All City Basketball Team at our luncheon, with guest speaker Joan Boand, Head Woman’s Basketball Coach at GVSU.
- MI Attorney General, Frank Kelly, spoke to the Lions on April 25 for Law Day.
- Peter Cook, President of Import Motors, Inc., told “The Import Motors Story.”
- Fire buff and professional column writer, Joseph Crump, described some of his columns, “Lowdown”, taken from congressional records and his experiences about fires.
- Kent County Director of Aeronautics, Robert Ross, talked about the development of the Kent County Airport.
- The Salvation Army Brass Assembly played at the Lions first meeting of the fall.
- “The wonderful world of magic recently turned a delightful trick of one of its devotees, former math instructor June Horowitz” as she performed close-up illusions for the Lions at the September 12 meeting.
- International Lions Clubs President, Ralph Lynam, was our Club’s guest at lunch on September 19, 1979. He is a member of the St. John’s Lions Club and President/owner of a public accounting and computer systems firm. At the time, he was a Lion for 28 years and had perfect attendance.
- GR Press columnist Gerald Elliot spoke on “The Case of the Sluggish Semi-colon” or “My 37 Years in the Media Trenches”.
- Blind pianist, Jim Stoner, performed for the Lions’ luncheon on October 10.
- Candidates for the 5th District of the US Congress, Harold Sawyer and Dale Sprik, faced off at the Lions Club luncheon on October 24.

- Victor Hawn, District 11C-1 Youth Exchange Chairman, talked about the Lion’s Youth Exchange Program and introduced Miss Adriana Berti, an Exchange student from Santa Lucia, Uruguay and brought greetings with the Santa Lucia Lions Club.
- Phyllis Danielson, President of the Kendall School of Design, talked about the school and its future.
- Carolyn Haas, Director of Welcome Home for the Blind, updated the members on activities at the Home.
- Pastor Fr. Jim Fellows gave the Thanksgiving Meditation, followed by The GR Christian High School Cappella Choir.
- The City League Football Champions, the Catholic Central and Creston football teams (a tie) were honored at lunch by the Lions.
- Bernie Gilliland, 11C-1 District Governor, updated the members on the activities of the district.
- Rev. Tom Zollman, presented the Christmas message, followed by the Salt & Pepper of Ottawa Choir Hills High School.

The Nuda Veritas also had numerous interesting comments, observations, and facts on Lion issues, including:

- Eighteen Lions gave at least 2 hours of service, testing eyes, in the District 11C-1 Sightmobile parked in front of the Pantlind Hotel.
- The '78 Scouting Expo was a great success.
- The summer golf-dinner outings were at these country clubs: Green Ridge, Elks, Silver Lake & Deer Run (first timer).
- The Fred Waring Show netted the Lions and Welcome Home, \$7,199.42.
- The Annual Ladies Night Christmas Party was on Saturday, December 2 at the Pantlind. Couples danced to the tunes of the River City Jazz Band.
