Tuesday, April 2 Economic Outlook, Paul Isely, Ph.D.

For today's program, Dr. Paul Isely, will be giving his perspective on the economic outlook for Grand Rapids, the nation as a whole and the shape of the global economy.

Dr. Isely is currently the Associate Dean for Undergraduate Programs in the Seidman College of Business at Grand Valley State University. He joined the GVSU faculty in 1995, after earning his Ph.D. in Economics from Purdue University. He also holds an M.S. in Economics from Purdue University and a dual B.S. in Physics and Economics from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

His research and teaching interests include firm/country level innovation, environmental economics, macroeconomics, technology development and regional forecasting. He is active in the community, including Gilda's Club, the Financial Planning Association and appointments to Kent County and State Commissions and Committees. He was also deeply involved in establishing the annual "Health Trends", which analyzes this area's trends in health indices, health occupations and health economics.

Looking Back – Grand Rapids Lions Club – January through December 1980

As we celebrate our 100th anniversary in 2019, and as the club looks forward, this series of articles looks back on the activities of the club, this time drawing upon Nuda Veritas editions that we have in our archives from January through December 1980. (some editions missing)

The Music Machine

At one of the luncheons, "The Younger Generation" from the Stocking Street School presented "The Music Machine." Their message to the Lions:

"We are 'The Younger Generation Choir' and we feel privileged to entertain you. We are accompanied by the piano, bass, guitars and drums, We present MUFFIN and MULLIGAN and the MARVELOUS, MAGICALMUSIC MACHINE. MFFF& MULLIGAN are a couple of darling marionette with 'love problems.' The MUSIC MACHI is am 'electronic gadget' with most of the answers."

The Tuesday weekly luncheons continued at the Pantlind Hotel. Here are a few programs:

- Dr Marvin De Vries, Dean of Seidman College of Business and Administration, spoke on "Will the Price of Bread Keep Rising?"
- Ronald Dykstra made a presentation about the "Present and Future of Junior Achievement."
- Matt McLogan, with WOTV, Channel 8 at that time, presented "Emphasis on 1980 Elections Nominations for President Democratic and Republican." [Now with GVSU]
- William Walling, Jr., spoke on "Coal Energy White-Knight or Dirty Villain." [Have times changed much?]
- Once again, Tony Dauksza, Alaskan Explorer, entertained the Lions with "Adventures in the Far North."
- Robert Ross, Kent County Director of Aeronautics for 13 years, talked about the "The Evolution in the Air Transportation Industry
- The Lions honored the Woman's All-City High School Basketball Team and West Catholic High School Woman's

Basketball Team, which were the 1979 Class B Champions.

• The following week, the Lions honored the Men's City High School Basketball Champions.

- Our Congressional Representative, Harold Sawyer, reported on Washington government activities.
- Commodore Fisher spoke of the "Background on Present Iranian Situation" and the factors leading up to it. The speaker was very knowledgeable, having lived and worked as the Principal for two high schools in Iran for 34 years.
- Board member of the MI Eye Bank, Richard De Wildt, spoke about the work of the eye bank. He also was a Hudsonville Lion and the District 11 C-1 GR Eye Bank Sub-Station.
- Dr. Gil Davis, State Chairman of the ACLU spoke on, "Who Needs the ACLU."
- Professor Ronald Wells, Calvin College, spoke on "The Christian Conflict in Northern Ireland."
- Lt. Colonel Kathleen Zehm of the Salvation Army spoke about its 100th Anniversary of Service in the United States,
- The first meeting of the fall was at the Masonic Temple on the 3rd floor ballroom.
- James Blankenship, Regional Manager for the Grand Rapids Post Office and 162 additional West MI Post Offices, spoke about their operation. He has responsibility for the activities of 2,500 employees.
- Casey Wondergem, Jr., Corporate Public Relations Officers for Amway, talked about his work and community involvement.
- Candidates for the 3rd District Representative for the US House of Representatives, Dale Sprike and Rep. Harold Sawyer, spoke at successive meetings in October 1980.
- Nuclear Programs Analyst, Darrell Lankford, spoke to the Lions. He was with Consumers Energy.
- Grand Rapids Mayor, Abe Drasin, talked about the what is happening in the City.
- Francis Peirce, Deputy Chief of the Police for Grand Rapids, spoke on Congressional Medal of Honor for a Veterans Day Program.
- Tom Taibter, The Chimney Sweep, spoke about "Making Wood Burning Safer."

The Nuda Veritas also had numerous interesting comments, observations, and facts on Lion issues, including:

- Knape's Rhinos (31 ½ 13 1/2) were the Champions for the 1st half of bowling, followed by Swarts'
 Wolves. Ed Veneklase was the individual Champion with an average score of 193.
- Jerry & Helen Hotelling were honored in the Nuda Veritas for bringing the Fred Waring Show to Grand Rapids for 17 straight years as a fund raiser for Wlcome Home for the Blind.
- Lions volunteered to raise funds for public television WGVC-TV Channel 34.
- The 2nd Annual Los Vegas Night took place on April 26 to benefit The Visually Handicapped and Hearing Impaired.
- The 60th Anniversary of the GR Lions Club took place at Gerribees II on Saturday, May 17, 1979.
- Starr's Hippos (28 ½ 16 ½) were the bowling Champions for the second half, with Ed Veneklase once again winning the individual Championship with an average of 200 pins.
- The summer golf-dinner outings were at these country clubs: Green Ridge, Elks, Silver Lake & Forest Hills.
- The Lions raised a net of \$6,700 for the Boy Scout-A-Rama for the Boy Scouts.
- Hannah Floral starts its second century of operations which has been owned by Lion Keith Crittenden.
