Looking Back – Grand Rapids Lions Club – January 1986 through December 1987

As we celebrate our 100th anniversary in 2019, and as the club looks forward, this series of articles looks back on the activities of the club, this time drawing upon Nuda Veritas editions that we have in our archives from January 1986 through December 1987. (some editions missing)

The Tuesday weekly luncheons return to the Pantlind Hotel, now renamed the Amway Grand Plaza Hotel after it was remodeled. Here is a selection of the programs:

- Dr. Marvin DeVries, Grand Valley State Economics Professor presented the Economic Outlook for both 1986 & 1987.
- Milt Rowher, Executive Director of the Right Place Program, talked about "Economic Development of Grand Rapids."
- "Auto Trends" was presented by John Maciarz, who was a manager in public relations at GM.
- Gorden Stauffer talked about "Waste in Federal Government", stemming from the Grace Commission. He was representing the Michigan Chamber of Commerce.
- "Peace Corps 25th Anniversary" was the topic of Kathleen Gamble.
- Chaplain Charles Fry gave the Easter Message, followed by the singing of baritone Dale Schriemer.
- "Education in China" was discussed by Harold Larsen, who was part of a group who went to China "

 ... and visited five schools with time to have discussions with students, teachers and school officials."
- Edward Goebel, retired GM engineer, got involved with the Great Lakes Foundation. While still involved with lake pollution, "attention shifted from contamination to problems to the great Lakes history of water levels and shoreline erosion. This was done because of the strong interest that surfaced as the results of extensive property losses."
- For the Academic Awards Convocation in both 1986 & 1987, the honored students listened to Davenport President Donald Maine speak.
- "Central America A Different Viewpoint" was presented by Rev. Douglas Van Doren, pastor of Plymouth Congregational United Church of Christ. He presented "an apolitical viewpoint on the Central American crisis. Through a program of Augsburg College (MN), he was on "a 12-day study tour of Central America, specifically Honduras, Nicaragua and El Salvador... the broadest possible perspective was sought... 0ver 40 interviews with US Embassy officials, government and opposition leaders, business people, urban and rural common people, church personnel, US Nationals in Nicaragua, academics, survivors of Contra attacks, and independent economist and researchers."

An Editorial . . . By Editor Jerry Knape (Sept. 1987)

The newsletter goes back to the origins of our club. Here is the thrust of the editorial message and some excerpts:

"The membership is very sensitive to change in their club bulletin, *Nuda Veritas*, the 'naked truth'... Over the years, we have had to change from weekly to bi-weekly publication due to cost. All other clubs that publish a bulletin do so on a monthly basis. Not all clubs have a bulletin. Your editor has cut back on pictures as they are the single greatest item of cost (half-tone \$9-15 now)."

"Each issue requires 6-8 hours to assemble, rewrite, arrange, layout, etc. for the printer – plus constantly remembering bits and pieces from the last issue and what must go into the next issue because of time and timeliness demands. Always your editor is sensitive to members, and to board action plus committee and project chairman."

"Some gradual changes have occurred. Another change has now been made. With this issue, a new printer will print and mail your bulletin to you. We will be using stick-on computer-produced address labels instead of the relatively "addressograph metal address plates. Changes in format, paper, typeface, style, and delivery schedule will gradually show themselves. Our new printer is American Speedy Printing Centers."

"Evans Printing Company has been the first and only printer of our bulletin for these many years. Our own Vern Evans closed his shop on Ottawa Avenue last December 31st, and has since 'brokered' our printing from his home. For many years the bulletin was probably subsidized by his generosity in charging low fees for the work of his company, as well as special printing orders like invitations, flyers, ballots, the 65th Anniversary Book, and the last Roster."

Current Editor's Note: After Jerry Knape had died and I began as Editor (in my novice state), I still worked with Vern Evans on the newsletter. He coordinated the final stages of printing and mailing before we started the email version. As we transitioned to email, over 30 members still had to their copies mailed. This gradually decreased over time.

- The Lions and Rotary held a joint luncheon "Presidential Symposium on Humor".
- U.S. Rep. Paul Henry of the 5th District of MI reported to us on the activities in Washington DC.
- John Doulas, Editorial Columnist for the Grand Rapids Press, spoke to the Lions.
- Greg Meyer, Long Distance Runner, was the guest speaker at the Fall Sports Awards Program.
- Peter Secchia was our guest speaker talking about "America" on January 20, 1987.
- Jeralyn Pinsky performed an excerpt from "The Italian Lesson" for our Valentine Party "Ladies Day luncheon. The play was being performed at the Civic Theatre.
- Lion John Kennedy spoke about "Autodie Michigan and The Auto Industry". He was Comptroller at the time, but later became the CEO and owner.
- For Saint Patrick's Day, Attorney John Tully presented "A Perspective on Ireland".
- Circuit Court Judge Stuart Hoffius was our guest speaker for Law Day.
- Attorney Dennis Kolenda spoke about the recent House of Judah trial. He was the lead defense counsel in the case.

Christmas . . . and our Lions

An article by Vern Parker [Editor's Note: was this the first year that our Lions took kids Christmas shopping at a major discount store?]

Partnering with K-Mart, "on December 13, 1986, nine Lions picked up 21 needy children at their homes and took them round-trip to K-Mart at North Kent Mall. They were served an 8:00 breakfast, got to sit on Santa's lap to tell them their Christmas wishes, and then each child was given \$20 to spend on his family and/or friends and \$5 to spend on himself. The kids had the run of an unopened store for an hour-and-a-half."

"The children wrapped their gifts with bright Christmas paper with a little help from our Lions. K-Mart furnished paper, tape, and scissors. The P.J Weber unwrapped some of his "magic" for the children before returning home."

"All over the USA, K-Mart does this in every store on the same day. Our Lions who are Santa's Helpers were Harry Jones, Bob Lalley, Sr., P.J. Weber, Dag Warmington, Joe Trenshaw, Bob Jamo, Chuck McGennis, Marty Burch and Vern Parker. The children (aged 5½ to 10 years) attend Northview grade school. Two children were hearing impaired and the school furnished an interpreter. In the name of the club and good citizenship – thanks to all who in return received a pleasure of sharing in the Christmas job of some little children." • The new City Manager, Kurt Kimball, updated the Lions about the activities of City Government,

• "The Impact of AIDS" was presented by Dr.

Richard Tooker, MD, MPH, Medical Epidemiologist for the Kent County Health Department.

• Dennis Cobler, 11-C1 District Governor made his official visit to the club.

• When he was a MI State Senator, Senator Vernon Ehlers spoke to the club following his re-election.

• Bill Steffin, WZZM Meteorologist, talked about weather for this coming winter.

The Nuda Veritas also had numerous interesting comments, observations, and facts on Lion issues, including:

• The White Cane Drive raised \$2,800 for the Blind Fund, a 24% increase over the previous year.

• Summer golf & dinner outings were at these country clubs: Green Ridge, Silver Lake, Forest Hills and the Elks [in 1987, not at the Elks, twice at Silver Lake].

• At the invitation of the 4th of July Gala committee, the Lions Carnival moved from May to the 4th of July weekend in the lot north of the G.R. Ford Museum. With the change, we hired a nationally oriented company, Farrow Amusement Company, to bring in larger rides (as well as kids rides) and operate the carnival games. The Carnival continued for several more years.

• Almost an entire issue of the Nuda Veritas was devoted to the Lions Carnival.

• The Lions Nut Sale continued in 1986 (profit of over \$1,000) and 1987.

• Ladies Night was on Saturday, December 13 in the Amway Pantlind Ballroom.

• The Health Expo Project reported over 400 people were screened: 55 vision problems and 49 Hearing problems were found.

- A \$4,000 check was presented to the Salvation Army due to the collections and gifts by Lions members.
- In 1987, the Grand Rapids Lions donated funds to paint Calder's "La Grande Vitesse" before Festival of the Arts. It gets painted every spring.
- Lions Club members voted by secret ballot to amend our Constitution in Article III, Section A to now read, "Subject to provisions of Section B hereafter, any person of legal majority... This change of a single word allows membership to women as well as men."
